Predictive Services Discussion:

Locally breezy north winds will continue in the Sacramento Valley with minimum relative humidity as low as 10%, while lighter winds but very dry conditions continue across the northern Great Basin. Temperatures will remain above normal in California while near normal temperatures return to the northern Intermountain West. Scattered showers and thunderstorms will develop from far southern Nevada through the Four Corners and into the southern High Plains, with isolated thunderstorms in the eastern Sierra. Isolated showers and thunderstorms are also expected across the northern Plains, while scattered showers and thunderstorms develop along a slow-moving cold front from East Texas into the Great Lakes. Dry conditions are expected to persist in the Northeast and Mid-Atlantic, while scattered showers and thunderstorms develop in the Southeast, with the most widespread storms in Florida. Cooler than normal conditions with scattered to widespread showers will continue across southern Alaska and spread into the Interior. Moderate trade winds are expected across Hawai'i along with drier conditions as showers are confined to windward areas.
